On January 1, 1863 all enslaved people were declared legally free. But, it could not be implemented in places still under Confederate control. As a result, in the westernmost Confederate state of Texas, enslaved people would not be free until much later. Freedom finally came on June 19, 1865, when the army arrived to announce that the more than 250,000 enslaved Black people in the state, were free by executive decree. That day became known as Juneteenth to the newly freed people.
