EWU LEADS **PFAS RESEARCH PROJECT**



An Eastern Washington
University professor and his
team of student researchers
are leading a project
to measure the spread
of potentially harmful
polyfluoroalkyl substances
— the "forever chemicals"
more commonly known
as PFAS — to sources of
drinking water on the West
Plains.

The long-lasting chemicals, developed in the 1940s to repel oil and water while resisting heat, were

for decades used in firefighting foam used at Fairchild Air Force Base and Spokane International Airport.

A \$450,000 grant is covering the cost of testing private and public wells, along with other water sources, for PFAS concentrations, says Chad Pritchard, the EWU professor of geosciences and grant principal investigator.

"If you go to most universities, these kinds of research projects would be given to master's or PhD students," says Pritchard. "But here, we just kind of push our students to the next level as undergraduates. And that's why they get hired and have great futures."

The project is developing a wealth of hands-on skills for students as they collaborate across agencies that include the Department of Ecology, Washington Department of Health, U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, U.S. Department of Defense, Spokane Regional Health District, West Plains Water Coalition, local municipalities and other stakeholder groups.

Geosciences major Jerusha Hampson, age 24, says the project has helped her gain hands-on experience as a paid research assistant while making a difference in her community. "It has been super rewarding," Hampson says.

The research is providing a path to safe drinking water — and potentially federal clean-up funds — for residents of impacted properties. Terri Cooper is the mayor of Medical Lake, one of the communities at risk for PFAS contamination. Her municipality manages the grant funding, and she is pleased with the partnership with EWU.

"To have this funded project to research an expanded area is invaluable to me as mayor, and also to the community, in that we will understand the extent of the environmental impact this has had," Mayor Cooper says.

Pritchard's team was pleased to discover most of the 140 wells they tested were within state action limits, with PFAS concentrations of less than 10 parts per trillion.

Their research will be combined with federal EPA data from the sampling of 400 additional wells, and any data the U.S. Department of Defense might share from their work at Fairchild. A report on these combined results is expected to be released in June.

GOLDEN EAGLE SCHOLARSHIP HELPS STUDENT WORK TOWARD CAREER GOAL



Eva Khamphouy is looking forward to a career of public service after graduation. The 20-year-old from Cottage Grove, Wisconsin will graduate this fall with a bachelor's degree in criminal justice and a double minor in psychology and sociology.

"I hope to go into law enforcement," says Khamphouy, who has already started applying for jobs.

Her journey to Eastern began when, as a 17-year-old high school graduate, she bravely moved across the county to a new state and community. She didn't know a soul on campus, but quickly made friends.

"Everyone here is super friendly. There are so many different communities within the greater school," says Khamphouy, who enjoys going to the gym and attending games and special events.

Khamphouy, who is far from home and on her own to pay for college and living expenses, works full time as a homecare provider for a client in Cheney who struggles with dementia. When Khamphouy was notified last year that she'd been chosen for an EWURA Golden Eagle Scholarship award — the first scholarship she's ever received — it was thrilling.

"I was so excited. I feel like me putting in all of my work finally paid off. To hear that it was this scholarship — I was over the moon," she recalls, thanking retirees for their support. "This helps so, so much in ways that they would never know."

Although she is busy juggling work and classes, Khamphouy gives back by mentoring a freshman student.

"She's a criminal justice major too, and she wants to go into law enforcement. So, I've been able to help her a lot with this whole process, because I'm going through it right now."

Khamphouy appreciates her program and professors: "I think that they really care about their students and just the overall, not only academic, but the overall well-being of their students, which has been really nice."
